## Ancaster Skating Club – 2026 AGM:

### Presidents' Report 2025-2026

As we wrap up another incredible season, I want to take a moment to reflect on everything we have accomplished together. Whether your skater was taking their very first strides in CanSkate, mastering new jumps, or representing us proudly at competitions, you have all brought immense joy, dedication, and passion to our Club.

Some key milestones we experienced this season:

- **Strong Foundations:** We successfully refocused on reinforcing the basics on StarSkate, giving every skater the fundamental tools to succeed. Our skaters applied these technical basics to boost their GOE scores at competitions.
- **A Magical Ice Show:** Our community came together for a wonderful year-end show that celebrated the hard work of every participant.
- **Our Brand on Ice:** We proudly established a more permanent presence at our facility by adding our club logo onto both ice surfaces.
- **Club Modernization Project:** We advanced our ongoing partnership with Skate Ontario to modernize operations and future-proof our club during the second year of participation in this program. Our ongoing work on the Modernization Project also helped us to be prepared to apply for Skate Ontario's new Star 1-5 Excellence Recognition Program.
- **Accessible Skating:** We increased the use of our skate rental program, making the sport available to more families in our community.

We were again able to run programming year-round, holding Fall, Winter and Spring sessions at Morgan Firestone Arena, as well as Late Spring and Summer sessions in 2025 at the Liuna 4 Ice Centre (formerly the Mohawk 4 Ice Centre).

The majority of our Learn-to-Skate programs filled once again to capacity, we increased participation in our Advanced CanSkate program and saw a larger number of skaters "graduate" to StarSkate. We successfully continued our team based coaching approach for our StarSkate programs, and Skate Ontario had the Club Modernization Lead visit our club several times per month to provide additional input and support to our coaches.

We started off the Fall/Winter season with a September seminar for our StarSkaters focused on improving performance skills, which included choreographer Julie Marcotte. We held a number of performance opportunities throughout this past year, including a Star 5&Up simulation in November, synchro showcase in December, Jingle Skate featuring StarSkaters and Advanced CanSkaters (also in December), a Star 1-4 simulation in January, and an Ice Show in April. A number of our StarSkaters competed in competitions, and all our SkaterSkaters continued to successfully participate in the Skate Canada Assessment component of the Star program. We also had several skaters achieve their Gold levels in Artistic, Dance and Skills over this past year.

None of our skaters' achievements would be possible without our dedicated coaches. Most of our coaches returned to ASC for the 2025-2026 season, including Blake, Braelyn, Danielle, Elena, Emma, Jen, Jennifer, Kaitlyn,

Lyndsay, Matthew, Nicci and Victoria. Coach Grace went out of province for university but was able to help out with our Jingle Skate in December. We welcomed one returning CanSkate coach (Naiya) as well as three new CanSkate coaches: Annabelle, Emily and Milania. Five of our coaches (Blake, Danielle, Elena, Jen and Victoria) served as the Coach Coordinators for our various programs – CanSkate, Advanced CanSkate, PowerSkate, StarSkate, Teens and Tots and the Ice Show. I would like to extend a huge thank you to our Coach Coordinators and all our coaches, you truly form the backbone of our Club and create an environment where our skaters continue to thrive and excel.

Fran Patterson served again as Club Administrator for 2025-2026 and her experience and knowledge has been invaluable in supporting the club. She also coordinated and mentored our music players and front desk staff throughout the season. Thank you Fran!

A big thanks is owed to our Board of Directors for all the work and volunteering they did in 2025-2026. The Board continued to move forward on some governance matters this past year, with the development of concussion and confidentiality policies, some updates to our By-Law, the implementation of some of our objectives in our new Strategic Plan, etc.. Our Board members were also involved in many other initiatives and tasks which helped the Club to run smoothly: spearheading the fourth annual used skate and apparel sale in September; running the skate bank rental program; helping out with skater performance events and assessment nights throughout the year, and volunteering for various Ice Show tasks are just some examples. I can't thank all the Board members enough for their dedication and assistance over the past year, you have been a great team to work with.

We have two Board members who are retiring as of today and on behalf of the Board, I'd like to extend a big thank you to Caitlin Andersen and Sarah Petruszkiewicz for their involvement over the past several years. I'd also like to extend a warm welcome to the new members who will be joining the Board today.

Finally, I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to our amazing skaters and their parents for their ongoing support and participation in the programs here at ASC, we would not exist without you. It is exciting to see how the skaters continue to improve and excel each year – congratulations to all of you and your coaches on another successful season. Parents – we value the time and support you give to your skaters, and your commitment to our skating family!

The following are some key priorities for the upcoming year:

- Club Mission, Vision and Values and Strategic Plan: Set the priorities for the second year of the Strategic Plan.
- ASC Board of Directors and Governance: Focus on volunteer planning and engagement to help with succession planning.
- Program Planning/Delivery and Coach Development: Set and achieve the goals for our third year of participation in the Club Modernization Project.

### Treasurer's Report 2025-2026

ASC engaged the services of Taylor Leibow LLP Accountants and Advisors (TLAA) to conduct the 2025-2026 Review Engagement for ASC. The review engagement was conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards; the review and procedures performed in a review engagement are less in extent (and vary) from those performed in an audit. As a non-public benefit and non-profit organization, the club is not required to perform an audit based on its current revenue/expense levels; Skate Ontario recommends Clubs consider a full audit once revenues exceed \$500,000.

The Club Administrator previously adopted the Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and continued to work closely this past season with TLAA to prepare the accounting records for the review.

ASC continued to see high registration levels throughout 2025-2026 and experienced a small surplus (\$4,146), although it should be noted we received a one-time grant of \$4000 from Skate Ontario due to additional costs incurred in the first year of ASC participating in the Club Modernization Pilot. After registration fees were not increased for the 2024-2025 year, an increase of 5% was applied for Fall/Winter 2025-2026 to help defray the City increase of 4% to ice fees and ensure a balanced budget. For the upcoming 2026-2027 season, the City is applying a 3.6% increase to ice fees; following a budget analysis, the ASC Board of Directors (BOD) has approved an increase of 4.2% to registration fees for 2026-2027 to allow the implementation of some items from our Strategic Plan.

The Board continues to oversee the ASC investment portfolio, and currently has \$90,000 invested in GIC's, an increase of \$10,000 over last year. Including investments, the net asset position for ASC sat at \$192,147 as of March 31, 2026, which represents approximately 5-6 months of operating expenses (guidelines for not-for-profit organizations recommend reserves equivalent to 6-12 months of operating expenses). ASC continues to be in a sound financial position as it moves forward into 2026-2027.

#### Key Recommendations for 2026-2027

- 1) Continue to use an engagement review instead of a full audit for 2026-2027.
- 2) The ASC Board should continue aiming to initiate its budgeting process for the 2027-2028 season by January 2027 with the goal of approving the 2027-2028 budget by April 1, 2027.
- 3) Continue to improve the methodology for setting registration fees, by using improved information regarding administrative and overhead fees and profitability.
- 4) Review regularly whether additional funds can be moved into the investment portfolio in order to increase interest revenue.

## Registrar’s Report 2025-2026

### General:

- E-blast communication to ASC members continues to be used extensively as the sole method of communication.
- All ASC skaters registered online with the Uplifter registration system available through our website. The club paid \$4719 in fees to Uplifter during Fiscal 2025-2026; this fee is partially proportional to the number of skaters using the system and covers the use of Uplifter (program management system, membership database and technical support). The Club continued to use Adyen as the Uplifter-linked payment processing provider. In total, the Club paid \$10,430 in on-line credit card transaction fees \$13,874 to Adyen. A further \$11 was paid to Square for transactions processed for Skate Swap sales. The Club therefore paid a total of \$18,604 in online related processing fees.

### Key Registration Points for Spring and Late Spring 2025:

- Spring 2025 season started March 17<sup>th</sup>. For most programs, the first two weeks of the season took place in 2024-2025, with the remaining 4-7 weeks taking place in 2025-2026.

- For Spring 2025, new Skate Canada membership were submitted between March 17<sup>th</sup> and March 23<sup>rd</sup> for skaters registered prior to the start of the Spring season.
- Four skaters were registered with Skate Canada after April 1, 2025 (one skater joined for Spring 2025, and three skaters joined for Late Spring 2025).
- Admin Fees:
  - A STARSkate Admin Fee – Spring/Summer 2025 of \$32 was levied on STARSkaters.
  - An ASC Admin Fee of \$22 for Spring was levied for learn to skate programs.
  - An ASC Admin Fee of \$16 for Late Spring/Summer was levied for learn to skate.
- Registration notes – Spring 2025:
  - The majority of Spring learn to skate programs were at over 80 % of their capacity, and 13 of 22 programs were at 100% capacity.
  - As in Spring 2024, an extra hour of PowerSkate was added at 8:15 AM on Saturdays.
  - After April 1 an additional hour was added to Mondays to allow three hours of STARSkate programming. An adjusted schedule was run for the first three weeks (March) of the 8 week program. For March we were bound by our Fall/Winter 2024-25 ice allocation.
- Registration notes – Late Spring 2025:
  - Late Spring programming was offered for 5 weeks at Mohawk 4 Ice Centre.
  - Only Advanced CanSkate, Teen/Adult and STARSkate (STAR 1, 1-3, 2-3, 4&Up and Adult 18+) were offered in Late Spring.
  - Registration for Advanced CanSkate was lower than expected at about 35%
  - STARSkate 4&Up registration was more robust with programs on the Tuesday at 83%, and Monday and Thursday at 76%.
  - Both 100% coached programs - STARSkate 1-3 Thursday and STARSkate 2-3 Tuesday – saw lower enrollments of 48% and 67% respectively.
  - STAR Adult 18+ Open saw very low enrollment – only 2 full spots and one drop in, but Teen/Adult enrollment saw improvement at 80% of capacity.
  - Registration fees were adjusted to reflect the higher hourly ice costs at the Mohawk 4 Ice Centre rented through Hamilton Arena Partners/Nustadia Group.

**Key Registration Points for Summer 2025:**

- Summer programs were offered at Mohawk 4 Ice Centre for 2025.
- Six weeks of Summer 2025 programs were exclusively on a drop-in basis as had been done in Summer 2024. If a skater registered for six or more drop-ins on the same invoice, a discount of \$3 per drop-in was applied to the invoice.
- While a limited ice footprint of 5 hours per week was scheduled on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, enrollment was significantly lower than expected.
- Programs offered;
  - Combined hour with Advanced CanSkate/StarSkate 1/Teen Adult 13+
  - STARSkate 1-3 Group and STARSkate 4&UP on both Tuesdays and Thursdays
- STARSkate 1 and STARSkate 1-3 registrations were at 27% or lower over the season.
- STARSkate 2-3 were at 36% over the season.
- STARSkate 4&Up were at 55% and 45 % for Tuesdays and Thursdays over the season
- Advanced CanSkate, were at about 30% of dropins per available spaces and, Teen Adult had only two registrants enrolled.

- Registration fees were adjusted to reflect the higher hourly ice costs at the Mohawk 4 Ice Centre rented through Hamilton Arena Partners/Nustadia Group.

**Key Registration Points for Fall/Winter 2025-2026:**

- All Programs were offered (PreCanSkate, CanSkate, Teen/Adult, PowerSkate, Advanced CanSkate, STARSkate, Adult Synchro, as well as Parent & Tot); most Fall 2025 learn to skate programs were filled to capacity (Sunday 12:15 PM programming was the only hour that was not at capacity). Winter 2026 weekend learn to skate capacities were adjusted slightly to mitigate coach absences to attend STARSkate and Synchro competitions. But due to the addition of three CanSkate coaches in training, minimal reductions were required.
- Parent & Tot was broken into Fall A 2025, Fall B 2025, and Winter 2026 registrations to offer programs for at least 5 or 6 weeks. Winter 2026 programs were able to run for 9 weeks due to no disruptions from hockey tournaments.
- Learn to Skate programs were broken into Fall 2025 and Winter 2026 seasons with separate registrations and Admin Fees of \$24 per season.
- With ASC's participation in the Skate Ontario Modernization Pilot project, our STARSkate program saw further implementation of the Group lesson, 100% coached time format was implemented for STARSkate 1-2, 1-3, and 3-4 programs.
- STARSkate programs ran for the full Fall/Winter 2024-25 season as in the past with an Admin fee of \$34 covering the full season.
- The StarSkate off-ice programming was continued based on the format introduced in Fall/Winter 2023-24 and were called Athletic Development or Jump Technique classes. A games-based model was used for the Athletic Development per the guidance of the Skate Ontario Modernization Project.
- Steel City Synchro Adult Levels 1, 2 and 3 Skating Teams were again registered through ASC
  - Registration and fees management was done via Uplifter rather than on a cash basis with team managers keeping a bank account, as was the previous practice.
  - Skaters paid a commitment fee \$100 in Summer 2025 and then registered for their skating fees via a program in Uplifter in August 2025.
  - All SCS Adult skaters paid an Admin fee of \$25 for the season.
  - A total of 55 skaters participated in the program

**Key Registration Points for Spring 2026:**

- Due to the 2026 ASC Ice Show practices between March 23 and April 10<sup>th</sup> with the performance on April 11<sup>th</sup>, the Spring 2026 season did not start until April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2026. Registration opened on March 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2026, but skating, and Skate Canada membership fees were accrued to the 2026-27 fiscal year.

### Assessment Committee Report 2025-2026

ASC completed its ninth full season with Skate Canada’s STAR 1-5 assessment program and its sixth full season with the STAR 6 and up assessment program. Use of on-line payments for STAR assessments continues to work extremely well. We continued to have a Board member (J. Floresca) submit the Star 1-5 results to Skate Canada, and all members on the Assessment Committee (J. Floresca, K. Cuthbert, C. MacInnes and A. Rocchi) provided ongoing support to running Star 6&Up assessment sessions with an outside judge.

For the Star 1-5 levels, coaches evaluate their own skaters during regular skating sessions. During the 2025-2026 year, our Star 1-5 skaters achieved a total of 126 assessments between April 1/25 and March 31/26. For the Star 6-Gold levels, assessments are conducted by outside judges brought in to evaluate skaters. During 2025-2026, ASC was able to hold 6 Star 6&Up assessment days (May 2025, June 2025, August 2025, November 2025, December 2025 and March 2026); a total of 81 Star 6&Up assessments were taken by ASC skaters with a pass rate of 83%, an improvement over the past few years. We also had several skaters achieve their gold assessment levels throughout 2025/2026:

- One skater achieved their gold dances in May 2025 and their gold skills in March 2026;
- A second skater achieved their gold artistic in June 2025;
- A third skater achieved their gold skills in August 2025;
- A fourth skater achieved their gold skills and gold dance in March 2026.

All Skaters and coaches are to be congratulated on their continued success and achievements!

### **StarSkate Report 2025-2026**

This skating season was a really positive one overall. Coaches worked well together and created a supportive, team-focused environment, and it truly showed in the progress of the skaters. We saw strong attendance throughout the year, great results at competitions, and a fantastic ice show that highlighted everyone's hard work and growth. While some skaters and families are still getting used to the newer structure, continuing to trust the process will help build stronger, more well-rounded skaters moving forward.

#### **Stars/Successes/Highlights**

- ★ Setting clear goals at the beginning of the season helped provide strong direction and purpose for each session, allowing skaters to better understand expectations and stay focused. As a result, skaters showed greater consistency and measurable progress in their skill development over time.
- ★ Starting off the season with basic skating skills for all skaters helped to improve skaters' overall technique and power. Coaches working together to build a unified approach to foundational skills helped to build consistent and strong technique for skaters.
- ★ We are proud of all our skaters who competed at a Skate Ontario competition opportunity this season! Five of our skaters competed in the Provincial Series, with one skater qualifying for the 2026 Skate Ontario Provincial Championships! We had 8 skaters compete in STAR 4, 4 skaters in STAR 3, 3 in STAR 2 and 5 skaters who competed for the first time in the STAR 1 category!
- ★ We are also proud of all the assessments our skaters completed this season. A total of 126 star 1-5 assessments were completed by ASC skaters between April 1/25 and March 31/26.
- ★ In February 2026, we started the application process with Skate Ontario for our club to participate in the new Skate Ontario STAR 1 to 5 Excellence Recognition program. We are thrilled to report that after Skate Ontario completed our on-site evaluation on June 2<sup>nd</sup>, we were informed on June 4<sup>th</sup> that we earned the "Exceeded Standard"! This means that we achieved all the minimum standard guidelines as set out by Skate Canada, as well as going that extra step to offer an exceptional program to our skaters which exceeds the minimum standards! Our work with the Skate Ontario Modernization Program over the past two seasons really helped to set the groundwork for this achievement.

#### **Suggestions for Next Season**

- Determine ways to increase skater participation by encouraging more STAR 1-2 skaters to skate 2 or more days a week.
- Increase the number of skaters participating in performance opportunities such as simulations and competitions.

### Teen & Tot Programs Report 2026-2026

Our Parent & Tot and Teen/Adult programs had another strong year, fostering a welcoming skating community through the dedication of our coaches, the enthusiasm of our participants, and the continued support of our board.

#### Stars/Successes/Highlights

- ★ **Ongoing Success of the Pre-Teen Program:** Our Pre-Teen program for skaters aged 10–12 continued to thrive, providing a welcoming, age-appropriate environment for older CanSkaters. The program supports skill development, builds confidence, and helps participants feel comfortable, engaged, and connected on the ice.
- ★ **Strong Engagement Across Age Groups:** Skaters in our Pre-Teen, Teen, and Adult programs demonstrated exceptional enthusiasm and commitment throughout the season. - ★ **Parent & Tot:** The Parent & Tot program continued to operate in conjunction with a beginner CanSkate session. This format has been positively received and continues to attract strong registration, while offering a smooth transition to our PreCan Skate program.

#### Suggestions for Next Season

- **Expand Parent & Tot Sessions:** Given the continued popularity and strong demand for the Parent & Tot program, consider adding an additional session to accommodate more families, reduce waitlists, and maintain a high-quality experience for all participants.
- **Further Develop Pre-Teen, Teen & Adult Programs:** Continue to expand and enhance these programs in alignment with Skate Canada's *Skate Canada Skate for Life* philosophy, ensuring skaters have meaningful opportunities to stay active, develop skills, and remain engaged in skating at every stage of life. This could include offering additional ice time opportunities that bring together participants of all ages, as well as exploring ways to include adult skaters in STARSkate programming to further support progression, skill development, and long-term participation within the club.

### **Ice Show Report 2025-2026**

*During the 2025–2026 season, we completed the planning and the majority of the behind-the-scenes preparation for the 2026 Ice Show. The success of the planning process was made possible through the collaborative efforts of our Board, coaches, and volunteers. We were also pleased to see an increase in skater participation this year, reflecting strong interest and enthusiasm for the event across our programs.*

#### **Stars/Successes/Highlights**

- ★ **Increased Skater Participation:** We welcomed a larger number of participating skaters this year, contributing to a vibrant and exciting show and demonstrating the continued growth and engagement of our club members.
- ★ **Strong Board Leadership:** Board members played a key role in initiating, organizing, and advancing the planning process, helping to keep preparations on track throughout the season. Having a dedicated individual assist with managing the ice show budget was a valuable addition this year.
- ★ **Coach Engagement:** Coaches contributed valuable ideas and feedback, particularly during music selection and program planning, and were supportive throughout all stages of the preparation process.
- ★ **Dedicated Volunteer Team:** Although we had a smaller volunteer team than in previous years, those who volunteered demonstrated exceptional commitment and flexibility. Contributions included securing sponsorships, creating props and décor, maintaining the costume room, coordinating costumes for group numbers, repairing costumes, and assisting with many other preparations. Increased use of high school student volunteers seeking community service hours helped reduce costs, strengthen community involvement, and provide valuable volunteer experience for local youth.

#### **Suggestions for the Planning/Preparation Phase of the Next Ice Show**

- **Continue Early Planning and Promotion:** Begin planning and advertising well in advance to maximize skater participation and increase community awareness and engagement.
- **Recruit Volunteers Early:** With increasing skater participation, early volunteer recruitment and clear role assignments will help distribute responsibilities more evenly and support a sustainable workload for volunteers.
- **Incorporate Ice Show Fees into StarSkate Registration:** Coaches suggested including ice show fees within StarSkate registration fees. This model has been successful at several other clubs and may simplify administration while encouraging participation.
- **Include Parent Admission in Ice Show Fees:** Consider including one complimentary admission ticket per participating skater for a parent or guardian as part of the ice show fee structure.
